VISITORS

Day Visitors

With the exception of Thursday, August 4, the 22nd World Scout Jamboree will be open for day visitors from Thursday, July 28, until Saturday, August 6, 2011.

Visitors are welcome onsite from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. (last entry at 4 p.m.) to experience all the common areas of the jamboree at their leisure. Visitors' entry includes a guided tour. The price for a one-day ticket is 150 SEK for adults and 75 SEK for children aged 7 to 17, and they are available via the jamboree Web shop: www.worldscoutjamboree.se/shop.

Names of Towns and Subcamps

There will be three towns for the participants and leaders, plus an adult town for IST members and other adults. The towns will be named after the four seasons. In Scandinavia the changes in nature are great between the different seasons, and this will be reflected in the different towns. The three towns where the participants and unit leaders will live are named Summer, Autumn, and Winter, while IST members and other adults will live in the adult town named Spring.

All towns, except Spring, consist of six subcamps, making a total of 18 subcamps. Subcamps will be named after geographical locations in Sweden. All subcamp names are connected to the specific town they are in. As a preparatory activity, your units will get to know what subcamp they will be staying in, and then learn more about that particular location. Subcamp placement will be sent out closer to the jamboree. The names are the following:

Subcamps in Summer:

Finnerödja—an area famous for its grand strawberry fields

Karlstad—a town where the sun always shines

Smögen—a small summer town by the sea with fabulous seafood

Stockholm—a city built on islands and the capital of Sweden

Vimmerby—the birthplace of the famous children's book author Astrid Lindgren

Visby—a medieval town on the popular summer island of Gotland

Subcamps in Autumn:

Bohuslän—a province where you can fish the famous crayfish that is feasted on in early autumn

Hunneberg—a beautiful national park situated by the largest lake in Sweden, Vänern

Kivik—a town famous for hosting a big apple market in autumn

Klarälven—a river where they used to drive logs, now great for rafting

Sarek—a national park in the far north of Sweden, with a wonderful display of colors in early autumn

Svedala—In the vicinity of Svedala, you can stroll in colorful beech forests during autumn.

Subcamps in Winter:

Jukkasjärvi—a town in northern Sweden famous for its ice hotel

Kiruna—the most northern town in Sweden

Mora—After 90 km of skiing, one of the world's longest skiing competitions ends in this town.

Polcirkeln (the Polar Circle)—North of here, the sun never rises for at least one day in December.

Åre—Sweden's oldest ski area, which has hosted world championships in alpine skiing

Örnsköldsvik—famous for its world-class ice hockey players

Cooking Food at the Jamboree

Cooking in the subcamps will mainly take place on gas-ring cookers supplied in the patrol kit. But each unit will also have a fireplace with the possibility to cook on an open fire. It is a shared fireplace, and it is up to each unit to share between the patrols in the unit. Each unit will get the necessary equipment for cooking food on an open fire for one patrol (a fireplace kit). We encourage you to invite other patrols and units to gather around the open fire, cooking your national food or your favorite dish.

Depending on how each unit divides the use of the fireplace, each patrol will get a chance to cook two to four meals on an open fire during the jamboree. During the Camp in Camp experience, most patrols will also cook their food on an open fire. Gas and firewood will be supplied in amounts sufficient to cook all meals. The amount will not, however, be enough for additional use of fuel. The material included in the fireplace kit will be added to the material in the patrol kit.

Pioneering Poles

Pioneering is a great part of Scouting in many countries. Scouts in Sweden usually build structures such as tables and benches, gateways, and fireplaces. At the jamboree, the participants will also have a chance to build some things with poles in their unit area. Table, benches, and fireplace will be supplied in the patrol kit, but it might be fun to build a nice gateway to the unit area. Contingents will receive at least one pioneering pole per participant.

Spring, the Adult Town

Spring is a huge town for 10,000 adults. This is where IST, contingent management teams, and jamboree planning teams will be staying. Contingents will be allocated plots for 40 persons. The plots will be mixed into a truly international town called Spring.

Access to Spring is restricted to adults. Unit leaders are welcome to visit Spring in their free time, but participants should not enter this part of the site. In Spring you will find all the facilities adults will need: showers, dining hall, information desk, kiosks, cafés, and free-time activities.

Food

Food for the adults living in Spring will be prepared onsite and served in the dining hall for all three meals: breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Hot food will be served for lunch and dinner, with vegetarian alternatives and special food for those with special dietary needs.

For the IST members working at night and for those who are fasting because of Ramadan, there will be food available at night.

Program

At the jamboree there will be scheduled and spontaneous program as well as arena events. In the following pages you will receive a presentation of some of the program as we hope the participants will experience it. The text is directed at the participants, and can be used by your unit leaders when preparing their Scouts for the jamboree.

Module Activities

We have planned a program of activities that will help you meet, interact, and build friendships with Scouts from all over the world. The module activities have five opportunities for you to do this, and we hope that during the jamboree you will take those opportunities and spend your days with us.

When you arrive at **PEOPLE**, you will be greeted by a team of enthusiastic IST members who will offer you a chance to experience and explore many of the elements that make up world cultures. You

will explore the cultural groups you belong to and find out more about who you are and what you believe, what things you have in common with your brother and sister Scouts, and the things that make you a unique individual. Maybe you and your patrol can come up with a culture of your own. The city of people will be filled with parks and streets, theaters and a market, a city of tranquility and noise, laughter and music. On the day your subcamp is to visit People, grab that opportunity. What better way to learn more about yourself and the people around you?

The world leaders at **QUEST** are awaiting your arrival. They have been eagerly preparing for a long time now to astonish your mind with challenges and build your thirst for adventure. Arrive on time because you will be treated to an opening ceremony, a musical extravaganza taking place at the main portal. From the portal you will be transported to different time zones: Discovery, Medieval, Viking, and Cave. Satisfy your quest for adventure by traveling between these worlds, and challenge other patrols in physical and intellectual activities while taking part in the overall Quest challenge. Quest will be a workout for both your brain and your body.

Across the program site, the staff at **EARTH** are hoping you will discover the magic in the soil, the power of water, and why the wind is more than just the movement of air. Before you get to the Earth module, perhaps you can put some thought into the challenges your home environment faces and how your patrol might initiate some solutions, and bring those thoughts with you. You will find time here to experiment with the elements and reflect on how we as Scouts can make this a better Earth.

Gather at the **Global Development Village (GDV)** and share the experiences of Scouting around the world. In the GDV there will be exhibitions and workshops delivered by major international partner organizations of World Scouting. Be inspired by the models on display and interact with exhibitors. Learn to think globally and act locally to make a difference and create a better world.

Do you dream only at night? This **DREAM** will focus on your path through life, and it is the jamboree's only night activity. Embark on a magical journey through life and find adventure in a different way. No matter who we are, what we do, what we believe, the Dream will happen.

All the module activities will begin at 10 a.m. each day and finish at 3 p.m., with the exception of Dream, which will start at 10 p.m. and finish at 2 a.m. Watch out for your timetable to attend each Module, but do take the opportunity to attend them all.

International Friendship Award

Are you ready for a challenge? Get to know people from all over the world, make new friends, and earn one of the most coveted badges of the entire camp!

Do you have problem-solving skills and work well with other Scouts? Are you curious about different languages and cultures? Do you know your Scouting? Then this is something for you to attempt.

The **International Friendship Award** challenge is run for participants at every world Scout jamboree and reflects many of the core values of Scouting. The International Friendship Award for the 22nd World Scout Jamboree is based around cultural exchange and will challenge you to undertake quizzes and tasks across the campsite. Participants must team up into patrols of four to eight people from at least two different nationalities and take on an array of physical and mental tasks. These are set to test and expand your knowledge of the camp, the host country, Scouting, and other cultures, and to meet new friends along the way. Tasks have to be completed within a timed period, so speed and dedication are of the essence! What better way to explore the camp and its participants? And at the end of this challenge, your reward awaits: the unique International Friendship Badge for the 22nd World Scout Jamboree, a symbol of meetings between Scouts all over the world, plus the friendships you will make along the way.

The International Friendship Award will be run from the town center. Upon starting, the participants will have exactly 24 hours to finish the challenge. After time has run out, the badge will not be awarded, so dedication will be necessary.

Camp in Camp

Nordic Scout groups invite you to Camp in Camp, a unique camping experience for all world Scout jamboree participants. It is your chance to experience a small Scout camp in the beautiful nature of Southern Sweden! Camp in Camp will take place on a small campsite no more than a two-hour bus ride from the main jamboree campsite. It is an overnight stay, from lunch to lunch, and you will go together with your patrol and at least four other patrols from different countries. All patrols must be accompanied by a unit leader.

Scout groups from the whole of Sweden and some from Denmark, Norway, and Finland have located their annual summer camps in the area surrounding Rinkaby. They have been preparing for your visit for over a year and are very much looking forward to meeting all of you!

Each Camp in Camp experience will be different as the Nordic host groups are responsible for the program. A lot of you will probably try canoeing or swimming in a lake, preparing wood and cooking food over an open fire, playing new games, and most important, meeting new friends. There will be a nice campfire in the evening, so your patrols should prepare something to perform.

Camp in Camp takes place between July 31 and August 3. Each patrol will be scheduled for one of these three nights. You will get more information about Camp in Camp at the unit leader meeting before you leave for Camp in Camp.

What you need to bring

- Clothes for a day
- Rainwear, warm sweater/jacket
- Swimming gear
- Eating utensils
- Personal care set
- Sleeping bag
- A sleeping pad. Try to avoid bringing camping beds or big mattresses.

All this should be packed in a smaller bag suited for an overnight stay. The Camp in Camp hosts will provide tents for you so you do not need to bring your own.

Food at Camp in Camp

Each patrol will bring their food from the jamboree to the Camp in Camp. The Camp in Camp hosts will provide similar kitchen equipment to what has been provided in the patrol kit. If you have brought or ordered special kitchen utensils for the jamboree, you should also bring them to Camp in Camp.

Spontaneous Activities

In addition to the scheduled program, there will also be spontaneous activities all over the campsite. These activities are open for everyone, and you can simply participate when you have some spare time. No booking is necessary; if there is room, just join in!

... we will offer a wide range of activities. You can experience activities based on the key concepts of nature, meetings, and solidarity, as well as adventure. For example, we can offer climbing, Most Primitive Scouting Experience, SenseAction Cinema, sport activities, tivoli (amusement park), badge swapping, Scout museum, Radio Scouting and much more.

All activities are open for everyone: participants, IST members, visitors, etc., but participants have first priority at some of the activities. The general opening hours are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. There will be some exceptions; for example, the crafts village opens at 3 p.m., and some activities will also be open longer, until 10 p.m.

The Tivoli Area will be near the big arena. Here you can enjoy a ride in the ferris wheel or try the merry-go-round. There is also a tower of hay, where you can climb up and then come down with a cableway.

In the Town Centers ...

... there will be exciting drop-in activities for everyone. Accept a one-minute challenge, play a game with your new friends, or sharpen your juggling skills to impress them! Of course, you can also sit down and create something of your own design to bring home, or add your contribution to a common project.

The town centers let you experience the seasons not only through their design, but also through their unique activities: the snow and ice of Winter, the water and sun of Summer, and the crispness and colors of Autumn. Some activities are available in all town centers, or travel from town to town. If you don't want to miss anything, you must visit all three!

Some activities are open all day, from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., but most open in the afternoon and close before darkness falls.

In the Subcamp Centers ...

... we offer a selection of small-scale activities. You can select from different board games, borrow smaller sports equipment, or perhaps learn a completely new skill!

It is also possible to contribute with activities, if you have something fun that you want to share with others, you just need to inform the staff in your subcamp center and they will add this to the activity list.

At the stages in the subcamp centers, there might be a singer performing or a music quiz going on—come and listen and join in. Maybe one of your patrols or units would like to perform. They can book a stage at the subcamp center and run their own activity or perform.

There will also be activities for the unit leaders. There will be small workshops at the subcamp centers where they can discuss, create, or just listen.

Cultural Festival Day—An Update

The Cultural Festival Day (August 4) is an opportunity to show your culture and share others, and we hope you are all busy preparing your contribution to this day.

Outline of the Day

In the morning you will have time to prepare your food, costumes, performances and activities for the day. By around lunchtime, our Camp in Camp hosts have arrived at the jamboree site and the Cultural Festival starts.

There are various ways for you to contribute to the Cultural Festival. You can perform music, dance, etc.; you can run your favorite activities; and you can prepare some finger food that is typical for your country or region and share it with others. All this will take place in the subcamps and town centers, on stages and on basically any free, open area. The normal activities and exhibitions at town centers, the Main Square, and the Faith and Beliefs area will also be up and running during the festival, so there will be a lot of things to do. The whole jamboree site will be a colorful, noisy, and sizzling melting pot of cultures.

After a break for dinner, we gather at subcamps and town centers for a Carnival Procession that will take everyone to the evening show at the Main Arena. The Carnival Procession will include music, costumes, laughter, and singing, with everyone creating the atmosphere together.

Stages

If you want to use a stage during the day, you can book this at the jamboree. There are a handful of stages of various sizes, and the sooner you book after you arrive at the jamboree, the better we can help arrange for what you need. The stages have sound systems, and there will be stage hosts present to help you with the technical equipment.

Ceremonies at the Jamboree

During the 22nd World Scout Jamboree, there will be three major events where all 38,000 attending the jamboree gather in front of the main stage. The events will be inspired by the three key concepts of Meetings, Nature, and Solidarity. There will also be a special Lighthouse Celebration open to everyone, and opening and closing shows for the hard-working IST members.

IST Opening Show (July 26)

We'll kick start the 22nd World Scout Jamboree and the IST Experience with the IST Opening Show. This is the high point of this day, dedicated solely to the IST members. Beginning with the IST introduction program, continuing with the Opening Show, and ending the day with a jamboree party in Spring.

Meetings—The Opening Ceremony (July 28)

Through music, performance, and fun you will get to know Sweden while meeting the world. Enjoy all the colors of the flag parade and the raising of the WOSM flag. Be sure to bring your best dance moves as you and 38,000 other Scouts will dance the Jamboree Dance together.

The Lighthouse Celebration (July 30)

Scouts from all over the world will gather for a special Lighthouse Celebration. The theme of the event is "Be a Lighthouse: Building on Common Beliefs," and will feature video presentations, appearances of Scout groups of various denominations from all over the world, music and a special message to all Scouts. This will be an opportunity that Scouts and leaders alike will not want to miss.

Nature—The Mid Event (August 4)

This show takes you on a tour through the beautiful Swedish nature, mixed with artists and performances. This is also the finale of the Cultural Festival Day, where we welcome the Camp in Camp host groups to the jamboree campsite.

Solidarity—The Closing Ceremony (August 6)

The final show and the final day, this will be a tribute to solidarity and friendship all over the world. We will also pass on the torch to Japan for the 23rd World Scout Jamboree. As we remember the good

times we had at the jamboree, great artists will entertain you. When the show is over, the night has just begun. Disco tunes will fill the field, and obviously there's only one thing left to do—dance!

IST Closing Show (August 7)

It is time to say goodbye, which will be done with an IST Closing Show. This is the time for the jamboree team to thank the IST members for the work they have done. And of course, there will be a closing party after the Closing Show.

Flag Parade

During the Opening Ceremony, national flags will be presented on the main stage. We ask every national Scout organization to please send a participant in official uniform to carry the flag. We will provide the flags. A rehearsal will take place on the morning of the Opening Ceremony day; the exact time and more information about this will be communicated closer to the event.

Help on Site

It is important that everyone has a safe jamboree experience, and there are many ways to get help if something happens at the jamboree. There will be **Listening Ears** at the subcamp centers and **religious representatives** to talk to in the Faith and Beliefs area. There will also be **Strolling Stewards** all around the campsite who you can ask for directions or help, or about any safety matters.

Please note that all IST members need to complete the **Safe From Harm** online course before the jamboree, and that the course is available in five languages (English, French, Spanish, Arabic, and Russian) on www.worldscoutjamboree.se/safefromharm. We also encourage all other adults in the contingents to take the course.

Services at the Jamboree

Pharmacy

There will be a pharmacy at the jamboree on the Main Square in the middle of the camp. It will be open during the daytime, every day of the camp. The pharmacy will sell self-care products, over-the-counter medication, and prescription medication. To be able to buy a product sold only by prescription, you must first contact the Medical Center before visiting the pharmacy.

Charging Facilities

There will be facilities for charging electronic equipment, at a fee. We however encourage everyone not to bring too much electronic equipment both for safety and environmental reasons. Additional information about what services will be available will be posted at a later date.

Postal Service

There will be a postal service at the camp which will enable everyone to receive and send packages, letters, and postcards. You will be able to buy postcards, stamps, envelopes, and boxes to send both within Sweden and abroad.

Sweden is still finalizing the mail-handling process for letters sent to the jamboree. We will distribute the address where mail for jamboree participants can be sent closer to the jamboree. Please note that any mail or packages arriving after the jamboree will not be forwarded.

Internet

At each town center there will be tents where you can drop in and use computers provided by the camp. There will also be public WiFi available at the town centers as well as in other places on the campsite.

Banking

There will be a bank office in the Main Square of the jamboree.

Payment Methods

To keep the amount of cash to a minimum at the jamboree, we encourage everyone to use credit/debit cards or cash cards. To facilitate this, the ID card that everyone in the contingent (participants, unit leaders, IST and CMT members) receive when checking in will also have a cash card function. This means it can be loaded with money and used when paying in all the cafés, shops, etc., on the jamboree site. It will be optional to use the cash card function on the ID card, and we encourage those who have credit/debit cards that work internationally to use these. It will also be possible to use cash (SEK, Swedish krona), but by introducing the cash card solution, we hope to increase the safety at the jamboree.

Credit/debit cards with the following symbols will be accepted at the jamboree:

- Visa
- Visa Electron
- MasterCard
- Maestro
- JCB
- American Express

Currencies

There will be a bank on the jamboree site. At the bank you will be able to exchange money and withdraw cash from ATMs. All prices at the jamboree will be set in Swedish krona, and it will be the only currency accepted in the shops, cafés, etc. (See the section titled “Bring a Little Pocket Money.”)

Simply Sustainable

Climate change, global warming, CO₂ emissions, and the greenhouse effect: Nobody knows exactly how great the future environmental impacts will be, but it is clear that we all have to contribute to make Earth a healthy and sustainable place to live. As Scouts, we want to make it happen, so let's start here and now!

A Green Jamboree

The 22nd World Scout Jamboree will be the first, but hopefully not the last, eco-awarded jamboree! This means the jamboree has fulfilled certain requirements regarding environment and sustainability by implementing measures that minimize the jamboree's use of natural resources. For example, all the coffee, bananas, and cocoa at the jamboree will be eco-labeled.

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

Scouting is about creating a better world. The jamboree will have an impact on the natural environment, but by simple procedures and climate-smart choices, your contingent can greatly contribute to making the jamboree as sustainable as possible. As a rule of thumb, there are three R's to remember in order of appearance: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle! It is as simple as that. Here are some examples of what your contingent can do:

Reduce

- Reduce your environmental impact by planning your travel to and from the jamboree site. Go by train or bus if possible and avoid unnecessary travel.
- Reduce pollution caused by transportation of goods over long distances by buying eco-labeled and locally produced products.
- Reduce the number of plastic bags. Bring your own bag when you go shopping.
- Reduce your food waste. Plan your meals to minimize waste and save leftovers that are safe to keep, instead of throwing them away.
- Save water by closing the tap whenever you don't need running water. Fill a container when preparing food or cleaning your teeth.

Reuse

- Refill your water bottle instead of buying new ones. The tap water in Sweden is safe to drink.
- Bring your own cup to the cafés, food houses, and the dining hall in Spring.

Recycle

- Recycle your waste, such as cans, bottles, and packages, at the recycling stations all around the campsite.

Recycle for a Green Jamboree

At the world Scout jamboree, we will take care of the waste so it affects the environment as little as possible. To be able to do this, we all need to sort and throw the waste in the right bins. Thank you for helping with this and thus making a major contribution to the environment.

Each thing we can use again saves the Earth's resources. Leftover food is processed into biogas that will be used as fuel for cars and buses and also into sludge used as agricultural fertilizer. An old newspaper becomes part of a new one, and a shampoo bottle can become a brush. In addition, less energy is used to make new products from recycled materials compared to making them from new materials such as wood and iron.

How to Sort Waste in the Unit Area:

When you cook, save all packaging. When all dishes are washed, use your dishwater to rinse out dirty containers. When the packaging is clean, sort it into the intended bins. Food scraps from cooking and leftover food on the plates should be placed in a paper bag in the food waste recycling bin. When you go to the supermarket, take the recycling boxes that are getting full with you and empty them in the containers at the manned recycling station.

How to Sort Waste When You're at the Common Camp Areas:

In cafés and shops, there are recycling bins for the packaging materials and items sold there. Please sort as much as possible here. Along the streets, there are bins for sorting the most common waste types. Sort the packaging that is not too dirty. All around the camp area there are bins where you can throw away rubbish that cannot be recycled.

Bring a Little Pocket Money—www.worldscoutjamboree.se/shop

At the jamboree, you will find various shops and cafés all over the camp. The kiosks, where you can buy smaller things such as snacks, ice cream, candy, or a cool drink in the summer heat, are the smallest kind of shops. At the cafés, on the other hand, you can sit down and have a chat with friends while having lunch or simply a cup of coffee and something sweet. There will also be sales points that have a wider assortment than a kiosk, also selling personal hygiene products such as toothbrushes, soap, and shampoo.

The main cafeteria in each town center serves hot food during lunch as well as hot and cold beverages, sandwiches, ice cream, and also some lighter meals during the day. Apart from the

kiosks, cafés, and cafeterias, there will be food houses hosted by contingents. At a food house, you can taste a number of specialties from that specific country while learning something new about the culture.

Last but not least is the jamboree shop, where you will be able to buy everything from souvenirs and badges to different kinds of profiled clothes and outdoor equipment. Our aim is to have something for everyone. The shop will be on the Main Square in the center of the camp.

Transportation Update

Arrivals

On the participant arrival day (July 27) teams will welcome and help contingents when arriving at one of the official entry points for the camp.

The official entry points are:

- Campsite (Check-In Centre at Rinkaby Airfield)
- Copenhagen International Airport (CPH, Denmark)
- Malmö Airport (MMX)
- Kristianstad Railway Station
- Kristianstad Airport (KID)
- Åhus Harbour

Please note that the above-mentioned entry points that are airports refer to contingents arriving by plane on July 27. The airports will not be entry points for contingents that arrive by coach; they need to continue all the way to the jamboree.

At the airport, the travel group leader shall contact the World Scout Jamboree Arrival Team in the baggage claim area, where they will receive information about the transfer to the campsite.

Coach transfers will be available from the entry points as well as the parking areas at the jamboree site. They will take participants and unit leaders to the Check-In Centre at Rinkaby Airfield just next to the jamboree campsite. More detailed instructions on how the check-in process will work and the responsibility of the travel group leader will be distributed closer to the jamboree.

Following the check-in process, the transfer coaches will continue from the Check-In Centre to the world Scout jamboree campsite. At the campsite, the group will be guided to their subcamp. Please note that you might need to walk up to 1.5 kilometers, so make sure all luggage is packed in appropriate bags.

On the IST arrival day (July 25), there will also be welcome teams at the entry points, and a similar routine as for participants and unit leaders will apply.

Departures

At the end of the jamboree, coach transfers will be available from the jamboree site to the same departure points listed above. The departure day for participants is August 7, and for IST members August 8.

The contingents must confirm their departure details with Contingent Support at the jamboree. The Jamboree Personal Transport Team will set the time of departure from the jamboree site in order to meet flights, etc. The decision will be based on time of day or night, likely traffic conditions, and so on.

Please note that the transport between the designated entry points and the jamboree site is included in the jamboree fee.

Scout Knives

As the closest international airport is in Copenhagen, many of you will be traveling through Denmark. Please note that according to Danish law, you may not under any circumstances carry a knife when sightseeing or traveling in Denmark. Knives may not be included in hand luggage when traveling by plane, so please ensure that any knives are safely packed away in your checked luggage.

Regulations for Bringing Food into Sweden

The regulations on bringing food from outside the European Union are very strict. Please check before you consider bringing something. We cannot replace food if it is confiscated.

Shuttle Services During the Jamboree

Local shuttle services will be available for members of the IST and Contingent Management Teams from the jamboree site to Kristianstad during the jamboree. This service is not available for the participants or unit leaders.

If someone from your contingent gets ill and needs to stay at the local hospital, transport will be provided for CMT members or unit leaders who need to visit members of their contingent.

There will be a vehicle service for those with disabilities. It is important to provide requirements well ahead of the world Scout jamboree via the Jamboree Registration System.

Ramadan

We are aware that Ramadan will start before the end of the jamboree. We hope that many Muslim Scouts will take the opportunity to share this important time of the Muslim year with fellow Scouts from all over the world. We are working to ensure that all the Scouts attending the jamboree will be able to follow their religious observances while having a full jamboree experience.
