## The Community of Scouting



#### **Understanding Community**

#### The Value of Community

However, when we adopt a community-minded approach, everyone can grow, flourish, and become stronger. How can this be achieved? We can begin by viewing Scouting as a community or a global movement:

- The more we support other units, the more Scouting as a whole will succeed.
- Small units need community support: By teaming up, small units can create outstanding shared experiences for all participants.
- Larger units have valuable resources: By sharing knowledge, equipment, and opportunities for bigger activities, they help strengthen the entire Scouting community.
- Councils that have had to restructure can partner together to put on larger events that may not be possible otherwise.
- Leveraging the Council Service Territories to work with multiple councils to help build up commissioner teams.

The possibilities for collaboration are endless. Our challenge today is working as a community, helping Scouting grow both in and out of our own units, and helping other units form, grow, and thrive! After all, Scouting's Vision is to prepare all youth to become better citizens to the communities they live in. We have the opportunity to model that in action by being better citizens in our Scouting community.
